Things You May Not Know about Kappa Gamma Pi

In the early 2000s, I was fortunate to have a boss and mentor who encouraged me to pursue a graduate degree. He also arranged for the tuition to be paid by our employer. I attended a weekend program at the Houston campus of Our Lady of the Lake University, which is based in San Antonio. I have always believed education is essential. This opportunity changed my life for the better in several ways. One of the ways was that I was nominated to Kappa Gamma Pi.

When I completed my master's degree in May of 2004, I was interested in any visual element that would distinguish me from the sea of black robes at graduation. I joined a sociology honor society called Alpha Kappa Delta and was nominated for induction into Kappa Gamma Pi. This gave me two sets of honor cords to wear over my regalia!

At the time, however, I had no idea I was one of a select group of graduates exhibiting academic excellence and leadership. Nationwide, there were 1,111 nominees to Kappa Gamma Pi the year I completed by degree. My experience in Kappa has presented opportunities to lead a group to consensus, present information to my peers, make new friends, and expand my knowledge and understanding. The KGP mission statement includes the following: "to awaken a spirit of Christian leadership." Being a Kappa and a member of the National Board has awakened my spirit of Christian leadership. I feel blessed.

Today, there are nearly 59,000 Kappas in the U.S. and internationally. Once you are inducted into KGP, you remain a Kappa for life. This is true even if you forget to pay your dues. Kappa Gamma Pi awards scholarships for graduate study or professional education each year. There are so many opportunities to be involved. Someone told me very early in my career that just being a member of an organization is not enough. They said you have to get involved.


My path to becoming the Plains Regent began as a Cornaro Scholarship judge. When Teresa Bosh who was II Vice President called to ask if I would be interested in judging the scholarship entries, she told me it was a two-year commitment. I said "yes." Reading all those entries was absolutely inspirational. At the same time, it made me feel like I needed to do more with my life. We had a couple of conference calls with the other judges. Everyone was great about providing tips and advice.

After my two-year commitment as a scholarship judge, the Plains Regent position became available when the Kappa serving in that role was appointed III Vice President by the National Board. Currently, I am organizing a get-together of Kappas in the greater Houston area. Your dues, which are only \$50 per year, contribute to Kappa's annual budget and defray some of the cost for us to meet face-to-face.

Every two years KGP has a national convention. It is a big deal! The 44th KGP National Convention will take place next June in Portland, Oregon. I will be there, along with the other Regents and National Board members. We will meet to discuss financial business, constitution revisions and other business of the organization. Kappa Gamma Pi is very pleased to sponsor the 2019 Cornaro Scholarship. The Cornaro Scholarship is named for Elena Lucrezia Cornaro Piscopia, the first woman in the world to receive a university degree of any kind. Elena Cornaro was a member of a noble Venetian family and received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1678 from the University of Padua, Italy.

This scholarship is available only to Kappas to advance their academic and professional careers via a graduate degree or professional program.

To be eligible for the scholarship, one must be a member of Kappa Gamma Pi, be a current dues payer, and have already been accepted into an accredited graduate or professional program.

The scholarship is competitive and based on criteria that demonstrate the applicant's embodiment of the Kappa motto: *Faith and Service*. Recipients also exemplify the values of volunteer work, leadership, academic excellence and well-defined career aspirations. With the support of our Kappa members, this scholarship has been awarded every year since 1985!

For 2019, one scholarship of \$7,500 will be awarded. The application deadline is April 20, 2019. discouraged when we would plan something and only a few people would show up, but I quickly realized that this is what happens after you graduate. I didn't let that discourage me from trying. I knew something good would result from my efforts.

I started receiving the KGP NEWS in the fall of 1998 after I graduated. Kappa has a convention in the oddnumbered years, so the first issues I received were filled with details about the National Convention that would be held the following June at Lourdes University in Sylvania, Ohio. I wanted to attend, but couldn't do it financially. But a thought occurred to me – maybe Kappa would like to have a convention in New Orleans. It is a fun place to visit and there is a lot to do here. I knew from my work on the Holy Cross alumni board that the college would work with us. So I brought the idea to the New Orleans Chapter president and KGP's campus contact. The initial concern was that no one from our chapter had ever attended a KGP convention. We agreed that I would ask the National Office what was involved before we made a final decision.

I contacted the National Office and spoke to Membership Secretary Pamela Wright Waitinas (Notre Dame College, OH, '61). She was thrilled to hear that we were interested in hosting a convention in New Orleans. After our call, I reported back to the chapter and we decided that we could do this. I had many conversations with Pam over the next two years. She guided me through every aspect of the convention, which included the planning for meals, housing, speakers, the Mass and the banquet.

In 2001, the New Orleans Chapter hosted its first KGP Convention. The first Kappa to arrive was Judy Gelwicks (Mount St. Joseph University, OH, '73). She was attending a trade show prior to the Kappa convention so she was in town a few days earlier than everyone else. We met for dinner one evening and she shared her Kappa story with me. I think this was when I first started to realize what it means to be a Kappa. The full realization became apparent when I met Pam Waitinas and members of the National Board. I had something in common with these wonderful, inspiring people—we were all Kappas, we were all recognized as leaders in scholarship, faith and service.

This experience put me on a new path—to become a leader, both inside and outside the organization. I stayed involved at the local level and eventually became president of the New Orleans Chapter. In 2005, I attended the National Convention and Board Meeting in Cleveland, and it was there that I began my first term

on the National Board. I honestly did not know what I was doing, but with the help of the other Board members I found my way.

I came home from that Convention with a new sense of purpose. I was excited and full of ideas on how to move the organization forward, both locally and nationally. There was so much to do, but having ideas is the starting point.

Then Hurricane Katrina happened. August 29, 2005, is a day the people of New Orleans will never forget. I was lucky—I did not lose my property, but most everyone who lived in New Orleans at that time was affected in some way. We were displaced and without power for weeks. Many areas did not have cell service, so communication was difficult. This was before social media and texting were options. Imagine not knowing if your friends and family members made it to safe ground.

It is during a time like this that you find out who your friends are. Before Kappa, my friends consisted of people from my childhood, high school and college days. Because of Kappa, my friends list increased exponentially by including friends from around the country. Once my cell service returned, I received phone calls DAILY from various members of the Board, people I met at the Convention and the National Office. They wanted to know what they could do to help.

My time on the National Board has been consistent since 2005, except for a short sabbatical in 2009. I have served as a Regent, III Vice President, I Vice President, President and now Past President. As I write this story, I am reminded of how much I have grown as a person and as a leader. I may not have always done the popular thing or made all the right decisions, but it is through the process that you learn lessons and become better and stronger for it.

Since my induction, I have found love, married that love, passed the CPA exam, obtained a master's degree in tax accounting, been recognized nationally for my leadership in the accounting industry, served on boards and committees for professional societies, and risen to a high level of management in my career. I serve as a coach and mentor, especially to young female accountants.
