The X-Ring

The St. Francis Xavier University ring, referred to as the X-Ring, is widely recognized throughout Canada and around the world.

The X-Ring has become a tangible symbol of the X-Spirit and the Xaverian Family. StFX graduates have distinguished themselves in all walks of life and wear their university ring with pride, demonstrating the influence of StFX throughout our region and in countries around the world.

The X-Ring was created during the Second World War. It is now copyrighted and it must be earned to be worn. Only a graduate of the university or a senior student is eligible to purchase the X-Ring. The first ring investiture ceremony took place in 1958. Reinstated in 1982, the ceremony is held every year on December 3 (the feast of St. Francis Xavier), StFX Day. It is regarded by StFX students as one of the most memorable occasions of their university careers.

A Call to Music at Home and Abroad

I am an American musician and ethnomusicologist currently living in Switzerland with my husband Ryan who accepted a postdoctoral research position at the University of Zürich in 2016. In 2007, I graduated from Saint Mary's College, Indiana, with a bachelor of music in vocal performance and was nominated to Kappa Gamma Pi. In 2008, I pursued graduate studies at Florida State University (FSU) and in 2015 graduated with my PhD in ethnomusicology.

As an ethnomusicologist, I study the diverse ways music lives in culture. My work has led me to explore music in Deaf culture, a linguistic minority that uses sign language as its primary language. Within this context, my research examines ways Deaf musicians break down stereotypes of music and deafness. I have also conducted fieldwork in the United States on the role of music within the lives of resettled refugees, documenting ways music can provide a refuge in which to mitigate challenges of transitioning from one place to another.

My passion for music stems from its ability to bring individuals together, educate and bridge divisions within and across cultures. I have explored musical diversity as an instructor at FSU and as a performer in a number of different ensembles. I presently serve as chair for the Society for Ethnomusicology Disability and Deaf Studies Special Interest Group where I lead projects and facilitate discourse on research and access within and for disability and Deaf communities. While I have used performance, teaching and research to foster cultural appreciation and social engagement, it wasn't until I met my husband that I turned to composition as well.

Ryan and I met at FSU while attending graduate school and, even though we each performed locally in different bands, it wasn't until after we were married and moved into our first apartment together on the corner of Park Avenue and Franklin Boulevard that we decided to play music together and formed the singer-songwriter duo "Park and Franklin." Within the context of this duo, we each compose music separately but collaborate on performance arrangements. Through



these collaborations, I started to compose a series of songs that aim to address social disparities within contemporary culture. "A Winter Song for the Homeless," for instance, was composed to foster awareness of people who lack access to basic human needs and whose plight remains invisible to so many. "Our Shells on the Outside," which was written in response to the Charlottesville rally violence, aims to use music to remove judgements based on physical appearance. "Terra Libertatis," which builds from the foundation of Woody Guthrie's "This Land Is Your Land," draws from American history to provide a diverse and varied picture of what it means to be American. "The Superheroes of This World" seeks to remind people of their ability to make a difference in the lives of others.

We each have our own stories and our own gifts that serve as unique manifestations of our faith. For me, music is my medium—one that provides a space in which to foster cultural appreciation, a diverse perspective and a richer understanding of human interaction.

Susan Lackey served as an officer on the KGP National Board for many years, most recently as I Vice President. On February 21, while on a cruise with her husband, Milton, to Singapore, Cambodia, Vietnam, Taipei and Hong Kong, Susan suffered a heart attack on an excursion to Wat Arun in Bangkok, Thailand.

KGP Past President Kelly Haden (University of Holy Cross, '98) learned of Susan's passing through mutual Holy Cross friends and emailed many Kappas with the sad news. Kelly's email noted:

"Susan's family spent most of the Mardi Gras season together this year. Milton and their daughter, Rhonda, were the King and Queen of the Krewe of Corps de Napoleon. Susan was so proud of them and was glowing the whole weekend. Her family was blessed to have that time together not knowing what was to come.

"Her Holy Cross family has suffered a great loss. It is through times like these that we recognize how blessed we are to have known such a wonderfully kind and giving person. She always looked out for me and I know she did the same for many others, never asking for anything in return."

important and what works in moving an institution forward. He completed his tenure at Algonquin College in Ottawa, Ontario, as the 7th president of one of Canada's largest and most innovative polytechnic institutions.

Dr. MacDonald's research and earlier doctoral studies at the University of Pennsylvania focused on higher education and in particular high-performing institutions and the impact of presidential leadership. He also holds a master's degree in education from StFX, an MBA from Université d'Ottawa, and a B.Sc. (physical education) from StFX.

While pursuing his doctoral studies, Dr. MacDonald worked with outstanding scholars and faculty considered among America's foremost thought leaders in higher education.

Our History

StFX has a rich history. Founded in 1853, St. Francis Xavier has a long and proud tradition as one of Canada's oldest universities. At that time, StFX offered the only university-level education in the region and



partnered with the Roman Catholic diocese to maintain strict academic standards in order to provide the best education possible.

During the first half of the 19th century, close to a million farmers, labourers and tradesmen came from the British Isles to the shores of Nova Scotia to seek a better life, joining the Acadians and Aboriginal peoples already settled here. Scottish Highlanders made up 67 percent of the StFX constituency, while Acadians, Irish, English and Aboriginal made up the rest.

Motto

Our motto *Quaecumque Sunt Vera*, or "Whatever Things are True" perfectly captures our values of integrity, dignity, truth and respect for all.

Location

StFX is located in the beautiful and historic town of Antigonish, Nova Scotia, a 15-minute drive from the ocean and the highlands and a two-hour drive to major urban centres. §

National Recognition

For 23 consecutive years, UP has earned a top-10 ranking by *US News & World Report* in the "Regional Universities - West" classification. For six consecutive years, UP has been the top Oregon school in *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* annual ranking of best values in private universities. And for three consecutive years, *Bloomberg Businessweek* has named University of Portland the top school in Oregon for "return on investment" in a state-by-state ranking of schools providing graduates with the most return for the price of their education.

Academics

University of Portland is Oregon's only comprehensive university with schools of business, education, engineering and nursing; a College of Arts and Sciences; and a graduate school. There are more than 40 undergraduate programs and 30 minors, as well as 18 graduate programs, and more than 1,300 courses. UP features small class settings (12:1 student-faculty ratio) and award-winning faculty. German professor Laura McLary was named the 2015 Oregon Professor of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation and Council for Advancement and Support of Education, and the University was one of only 14 schools nationwide to be named a top producer of both student and faculty Fulbright awards in 2015-2016.

The University offers a rich resource for the community through educational opportunities, research and experts, in addition to a host of community offerings such as athletic events, cultural events, speakers and lectures.

Believing that education takes place both inside and outside the classroom, UP places a strong emphasis on residential living with 94 percent of freshmen and 57 percent of the total student body living in one of the University's 10 residence halls, including the newest hall, Lund Family Hall, which opened in fall 2016.

The University's commitment to an education outside the classroom means that UP offers a wide variety of extra-curricular programming, including an inclusive Campus Ministry program; local, national and international volunteer opportunities through the Moreau Center; fitness, intramurals and outdoor activities through the recreation services program in the Beauchamp Recreation and Wellness Center; and an active student government, Associated Students of the University of Portland.

Athletics

The Portland Pilots are members of the West Coast Conference and compete at the NCAA Division 1 level. There are sixteen intercollegiate teams: baseball (M), basketball (MW), cross country (MW), rowing (W), soccer (MW), tennis (MW), indoor and outdoor track and field (MW), and indoor and beach volleyball (W).

Alumni

UP students and alumni are resources for research, internships and full-time employment. More than half of University of Portland's 37,000 alumni reside in the Portland/Vancouver metropolitan area. §
