Using the sphere of influence as a guide and years of experience, Chris Adams (Benedictine University, Il, '16) will review how mentorship can enhance your networking efforts and how networking can be leveraged to create a place for mentorship at a company or career of choice. Real life tools and techniques will be discussed with the goal to enhance the capabilitites of the attendees to leverage both activities. At the end of the discussion, attendees will have a template for enhancing the effectiveness of their current networking and mentoring activities. Participants will have a new view into the links of both processes to accelerate their career goals.§

In Memoriam...Marjorie Mehigan Durbin

Over 60+ years ago, Marge Durbin (Notre Dame College, OH, '56) and I volunteered together in a notyet-formally-established KGP National Office in the home of the National President at the time, Frances Burger Noetzel. Kappa was a vibrant, growing society

with many college and university affiliates nominating hundreds of new members every year. As the fledgling office expanded, Marge and I continued to assist the first National Executive Secretary, Anne Bormann Murray. Marge became the second National Executive Secretary on Anne's retirement and I took on the responsibilities of NEWS Editor (a position that I held for 45 years). We were both graduates of Notre Dame College, South Euclid, Ohio.


For the next 30 years, from 1967 to 1997, Marge served the Kappa organization as

National Executive Secretary and as a member of the national board. She was a tireless advocate for Kappa Gamma Pi. In fulfilling the myriad responsibilities for her position she worked with every president during her time as National Executive Secretary.

In the division of national KGP work, Marge and I had Kappa offices in our own homes and frequently traveled back and forth between her home in Stow, Ohio, and my home in Chardon, Ohio. We also shared hotel and college dorm rooms for many conventions and board meetings - and those were the pre-computer days when we stuffed the rooms with boxes of papers and supplies necessary to run a meeting.

Not much room left for suitcases. But it was fun and we had such good Kappa friends to help us out.

Mother of three sons, and grandmother and great-grandmother, Marge and her late husband, Joe, were very involved members of their parish in Stow. Marge taught CCD/PSR classes, participated in renewal programs, Marriage Encounter, Pre-Cana classes and CYO camps. Also active in her community, Marge was a former president of the Stow PTA Council and Stow Women's Club. She and her



Marge died on December 21, 2021, after a brief illness, at age 87. She had completed a life of "Faith and Service" for Kappa, for her church, for her community.

May this dedicated member of Kappa Gamma Pi now rest in peace. §

History Corner: KGP News...the History of KGP

Although preliminary small newsletters were printed in the late 1920s, the first issue of the official KAPPA GAMMA PI NEWS, a trial edition, was published in December 1930 by the St. Louis, MO, chapter. It held tidbits of information, poetry and discussions of topics such as the need for a quota of nominees that each college is allowed to elect.

Publication was intermittent for the next few years and the format of the paper changed drastically in size and style. By 1939 the paper was published on a regular basis and had been standardized in size. The KGP NEWS continued to be issued through World War II although national meetings were not held. Dues were 50 cents!

During these earlier times, the responsibility for the paper moved from chapter to chapter every two to four years. An editor was selected and was involved in the publication AND mailing of the paper to members using a variety of addressing methods: by hand, typewriter, addressograph plates. Cumbersome files were shipped around the country, printers sought out, new "helpers" recruited.

By the early 1960s the rotating editor process had become unwieldy. National President Frances Noetzel determined that the KGP NEWS had to find a permanent home. That home was in the Chardon, OH, residence of the editor who was first appointed in 1964 and remained editor for 45 years!

The KGP NEWS is a forum for thoughtful, incisive writing and provocative articles and features. The paper, published fourtimes a year and mailed to national dues payers, has tackled difficult topics: genetics, morality in medical decision-making, nuclear power/disarmament, illiteracy, loneliness, alcoholism, battered women, right-to-life and euthanasia, women in ministry, peace and justice issues, ecumenism, communications, Pacific Rim concerns, Biblical relevance and many more.

The KGP NEWS of the 21st century is produced totally by computer. The database which generates the mailing list is also sent to an outside mailing house to be merged with US Postal Service software to create barcodes. Technology marches on!§

Announcing the 2022 Cornaro Scholarship Opportunity

Kappa Gamma Pi is pleased to be able to offer two Cornaro Scholarships in 2022 because of the donations from our members. The Cornaro Scholarship Fund was established in 1985 and is named after Elena Lucrezua Cornaro Piscopia, the first woman in the world to receive a university degree of any kind. Elena Cornaro was a member of a noble Venetian family and received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1678 from the University of Padua, Italy.

This scholarship is exclusive to Kappa Gamma Pi members and allows them the opportunity to advance their academic and professional careers by pursuing a graduate degree or professional program. In order to be eligible for the scholarship, one must be a member of Kappa Gamma Pi, be a current dues payer, and have already been accepted into an accredited graduate or professional program.

The scholarship is competitive and based on the criteria that applicants demonstrate; how they embody the Kappa motto: *Faith and Service*. Recipients must also exemplify the values of volunteer work, leadership, academic excellence and well-defined career aspirations.

With the support of Kappa members, KGP has awarded many scholarships to Kappas since 1985! All Cornaro Scholarship Fund contributions are tax deductible. Thank you to all who donate to the Cornaro Fund each year. We appreciate your generosity.

For 2022, two scholarships of \$3,500 will be awarded. The deadline for applications and letters of reference is April 20, 2022.
