Katelyn Wood Best (*Saint Mary's College*, *IN*, '07) is an American musician and ethnomusicologist. She received her Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance in 2007 from Saint Mary's College, Indiana where she was nominated to Kappa Gamma Pi. Katelyn followed

her Bachelors degree with a Masters of Music in 2010. In 2015, she graduated with her PhD in Musicology/ Ethnomusicology from Florida State University (FSU). Ethnomusicology is a form of musicology which studies humans and culture in music. Katelyn pursued a PhD in ethnomusicology because of the ability to be constructively employed within society due to its focus on culture and the expression of music. Her work in this field has allowed her to study the diverse ways music lives in culture.

Music has been a constant in Katelyn's life. Music filled the rooms of her childhood home and served as a way to connect and positively affect people through performance. She grew up playing the piano and while the house she grew up in was small her grandmother's baby grand piano filled the living room. Her musical and compositional voice was shaped by that *See Musicking page 2*

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piano. Katelyn was raised in a family and Catholic community that emphasized service and social justice which led to her writing pieces to educate, promote positive change, and provide solace or a form of catharsis.

Katelyn's Lecture will be based on Christopher Small's concept of Musicking which approaches the understanding of music by using it as a verb, "to music." According to Small, "the meaning of musicking

During her time at FSU, she performed in a number of different ensembles. Katelyn served as chair for the Society for Ethnomusicology Disability and Deaf Studies Special Interest Group where she led projects and facilitated discourses on research and access within and for disability and deaf communities. Katelyn met her husband Ryan during her graduate studies and once they

were married and in their first apartment they decided to play music together and formed the singersongwriter duo "Park and Franklin." Within the duo, they compose music separately and collaborate on the performance arrangements. Through these collaborations she composed series of songs to address social disparities with contemporary culture. "Our Shells on the Outside," written in response to the Charlottesville rally violence, aims to use music to remove judgments based on physical appearance. "A Winter Song for the Homeless" was composed to foster awareness of people who lack access to basic human needs and whose struggle remains invisible to many. And "Terra Libertatis" which is built on the foundation of Woody Guthrie's "This Land Is Your Land" drawing from American history to provide diverse pictures of what it means to be American.

Her research further led her to explore music in deaf culture, which uses sign language as the primary language. This research resulted in an independent collaborative project with her husband and father, developing into an album and a series of live performances in national parks through the United States. This lecture will explore different forms of musicking and examines ways music can shape relationships, amplify voices, and inspire change.

Everyone has their own story and gifts that can be used to serve others. For Katelyn, music is her medium to foster diversity, cultural appreciation and a richer understanding of human interaction. Katelyn's work can be listened to on Spotify including her album title *Tapestry of Loss and Love*. This album includes a song titled "Your Smile" which is a poem written by her father about her mother's smile.§

2022 Cornaro Scholarship Opportunity

Kappa Gamma Pi is pleased to be able to sponsor the 2022 Cornaro Scholarship. The Cornaro Scholarship was established in 1985. The scholarship is named after Elena Lucrezia Cornaro Piscopia, the first woman to receive a university degree of any kind. Elena Cornaro was a member of a noble Venetian family and received a Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1678 from the University of Padua, Italy.

This scholarship is exclusive to Kappa Gamma Pi members and is an opportunity for applicants to advance their academic and professional careers by pursuing a graduate degree or professional program. In order to be eligible for the Cornaro Scholarship one must be a member of Kappa Gamma Pi, be a current dues payer, and have already been accepted into an accredited graduate or professional program.

The Cornaro Scholarship is competitive and applicants must demonstrate how they embody the Kappa motto: Faith and Service. Recipients must also exemplify the value of volunteer work, leadership, academic excellence and well-defined career aspirations.

Thanks to the support of Kappa members, KGP has awarded \$256,520 in scholarships to 95 deserving Kappas since 1985! All Cornaro Scholarship Fund contributions are tax deductible. Thank you to all who donate to the Cornaro Fund each year. We appreciate your generosity.

KGP's National Service Projects

Kappa Gamma Pi has three current national service projects. At the 2001 National Convention in New Orleans improving literacy was chosen as a focus. In 2005 at the Cleveland Convention alleviating world hunger was added as a second project. The most recent addition was earth renewal which was added during the 2009 Convention in New Orleans. Many chapter members and Members-at-Large do not live close to a chapter participating in volunteer activities but all KGP members can get involved in national service projects in their local areas.§

Kappa Gamma Pi Projects through the Ages

Kappa Gamma Pi has a very rich history of initiatives and service that has helped shape this organization and benefited our community at large. Over the organizations 96 years of existence there have been more than 75 Kappa chapters that have existed for varying periods of time. In 1935, chapters became an opportunity for women post-Depression to use their gifts and intellect to help others. Today chapter activity has decreased for societal reasons and women are in the workforce. In addition, people have limited time and members have had to make hard choices about how to use their free time. Despite all the challenges chapters have faced over the decades, they still exist for the reasons they were initially established: service to others and the building of a faith community.

Looking at activities sponsored over the years by chapters is inspiring. Issues of contemporary society became concerns of Kappa: refugees, mentally and physically disadvantaged, and the homeless. Through the 1930s-1960s as opportunities to volunteer increased, Kappas became involved in areas of civil and voting rights, anti-communism, the "Catholic Action" movement, apostolic formation, pro-life. They assisted adolescent girls in crisis, lobbied on Capital

Hill, supported Mother Teresa and her missionaries, and were there whenever vital causes existed.

Projects sponsored by the national organization were plentiful in the early days of Kappa Gamma Pi. In 1932 the first **Short Story Contest** was conducted at affiliated colleges and grew to the point a monetary prize was awarded. The contest continued successfully and in 1965, it was renamed the **Creative Writing Contest** and two national Catholic magazines agreed to publish the winning entry.

At the first post-war National Convention in 1947, delegates in St. Louis established the Kappa *Listening Post* to make Kappa influence felt nationally. The *Listening Post*, first directed by the Chicago Chapter, expressed commendation or disapproval of features in advertising, radio, newspaper and movies which were nationally distributed. The *Listening Post* expanded

to include decency in advertising and illustrations, promotion of the National Organization for Decent Literature (NODL), and eventually, support of good programming in the television industry. As a national project, *Listening Post* functioned until 1970 with emphasis changing to focus on civil rights issues. *Listening Post* was reactivated in the 1990s as an intermittent column in the KGP NEWS and a forum for reader opinion and reaction.

Involvement with the Junior Great Books Program began in 1957. Chapters played an important role in developing a project for gifted children. By 1965, chapters

had organized enrichment programs for inner city children working with diocesan education officers to provide resources and materials.

Kappa chapters were in the forefront for liturgical implementation throughout the 50s, 60s and 70s, producing numerous study material and a recording of liturgical music. Post-Vatican II, chapters took up the challenge of education on other religious beliefs by sponsoring ecumenical programs, open houses in churches, dialogues with ministers and laity from other congregations. In many dioceses, Kappas were the leaders of ecumenical commissions and councils.

In the early 60s, the "academic freedom" crisis in Catholic schools sparked interest. Kappas set out to prove that Catholic Education on all levels held an important place in America. The KGP National Education Project (NEP) replaced the Creative Writing Contest as an effective college and public relation tool. The NEP consolidated the efforts of hundreds of Kappas across the country who wanted to follow the directive of Vatican II for the laity to be more responsible for education. Chapters were ahead of the times in giving parents comprehensive assistance in raising their children. Study outlines and bibliographies were prepared to convey the benefits of private education from preschool to college as well as to review proposed legislation. Kappas sought tuition grant programs, wrote master plans for education in dioceses and lobbied KGP Projects through the Ages

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on state and national levels for legislation for federal loans or tax credits for private colleges.

Kappas worked for health, safety and nutritional services for children in ALL schools, supported remedial education and bus transportation for ALL children and researched the certification of teachers in Catholic schools. Many Kappas accepted appointments to lay boards of trustees at formerly all-clerical/all-religious institutions. The results of the NEP, which lasted officially from 1963 to 1972, were far-reaching and continue to this day. NEP was the most effective and productive national project Kappa Gamma Pi ever directed. Ultimately, Kappa met many of its national goals and provided valued support and leadership at a crucial time in educational history.

As the need for the NEP gradually declined, the project evolved into the **College Relations Committee** (CRC). CRC was established to support Kappa affiliates to maintain good communications with affiliate colleges and universities. The turmoil in education caused the closing of some KGP affiliates and the merger of others; some colleges lost their Catholic identity completely; many all-women's schools became co-educational. Because of the high turnover rates in college administrations, Kappa needed to establish better forms of communication with affiliates. The national **College Liaison Program**, begun in 1978, still exists in the work of building and keeping good relationships with our colleges and universities.

At the New Orleans National Convention in 2001, delegates approved a new national project aimed at improving rates of literacy through established literacy programs. The National Literacy Project was enthusiastically endorsed by Kappas throughout the country who continue to report their numerous activities. In 2005 at the Cleveland Conven-

tion, delegates approved the expansion of the literacy project to include a focus on reducing world hunger. This project, **Feed My Hungry**, does not supplant the National Literacy Project, but enhances it. Members are encouraged to participate in local volunteer and service efforts.

In 2020, Kappasat-Large continued to answer the call to service when needed. KGP had many members who were front line workers during the COVID-19 pandemic. These members continue

to use their gifts and talents working on the front lines to help those in need.

Since inception, the focus of the Kappa national organization has emphasized national projects to help center chapter activities. The great majority of Kappa members do not live within chapter boundaries and their fulfillment of Kappa goals and commitments are individual and self-directed. The three current national projects of literacy and hunger alleviation and renewal of the Earth are uniquely suited to these Kappas-at-Large.

One national project has resisted change: the biennial Faith and Service Award, is given at National Conventions to non-Kappas who exemplify outstanding leadership in local and national church and secular affairs. Kathryn O'Hay Granahan, Treasurer of the United States, was the first recipient of this distinguished award in 1963 at the Philadelphia Convention. It has been presented at every convention since to an impressive group of community leaders and activists, educators, advocates for the arts and national and international directors of service agencies. §

Winter Olympic Facts

The Winter 2022 Olympics took place in February and many watched intently as athletes at the top of their game competed for gold in Beijing. When the Olympics take place, it is interesting to look into the facts of these historic games such as:

- The Winter Olympic Games were first held in Chamonix, France in 1924.
- 12 countries have participated in every Winter Olympic Games: Austria, Canada, Finland, France, Great Britain, Hungary, Italy, Norway, Poland, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United States.
- Six countries have won medals at every Winter Olympic Games: Austria, Canada, Finland, Norway, Sweden, and the United States.
- The United States is the only country to have won a gold medal at every one.
- Noriaki Kasai of Japan holds the record for the most appearances at the Winter Olympics as an athlete. He participated in eight straight Olympics from 1992 to 2018.§

A Kappa Legacy

Beverly Domalski (Mary Manse College, OH, '52) was an involved Kappa and served as an officer for the Toledo Chapter. She graduated from Notre Dame Academy, received a Bachelor of Arts from Mary Manse College, and earned a Master of Arts from Case Western Reserve in studio art, art history, and philosophy.



She was a kind woman of faith who was deeply dedicated to the mission of the Catholic Church and Catholic Institutions. Beverly was an art teacher in the Toledo Public School system where she had a long and rewarding career. After she retired she continued to volunteer in parochial schools, the Toledo Museum of Art, the Toledo Botanical Gardens, Lourdes Uni-

versity's Lifelong Learning Program, and many more.

Beverly grew up as an only child and watched her philanthropic mother's example, which is where she learned the importance of giving back to your community. Beverly did an interview for the AtLourdes magazine in the Spring of 2013 when she was asked why giving was so important. She summed it up perfectly, "It builds a network for forwarding the valuable elements of our culture. I give to Lourdes because I believe in its unique approach to providing a rich authentic background for learning and meaningful approach to a full creative life."

The late Beverly Domalski was known for her dedication to her faith, belief in lifelong learning, belief in a creative life, and her heart for giving. While not all of us had the privilege to know Beverly, we can learn a lot from the example she set in the life she lived and the legacy she has left behind.§
